
Acknowledge

A strategy to break the silence, to learn from our history

To be able to acknowledge a part of one's past, one needs to gain knowledge of what has happened, interpret, and process this.

At the Nationaal Archief in The Hague, an archive is stored that contains files of the more than 300.000 people who were accused of collaborating with the German occupiers after the Second World War. Daily, offspring of these suspects visit this archive, the CABR, to find answers. It became evident there are intergenerational consequences of those choices and actions by their ancestors: inherited feelings of shame, accountability and anger.

This Design Thesis proposes an enriched visitor journey to integrate the human measure during the exploration of one's familial history.
