Amsterdam IJburg

- 18 000 Dwellings
- 220 + 150 ha
- VINEX Policy
- Mainly focussed on housing & businesses



March 1997

- 430 Dwellings
- 289 ha

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Arnhem Stadsblokken-Meinerswijk

Conflict:

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Referendum

- corrective, with threshold
- Municipality agreed to respect the outcome
- 41% voted
- 40% Yes, 60% No

• Dwellings can be built somewhere else



Referendum

- corrective, no threshold
- Municipality agreed to respect the outcome
- 24, 1 % voted
- 64,7% Yes, 34,5% No

UAD Long time span, uncertainties



Often **not 100% against** whole UAD plan UAD Plan, **coherent**. leaving out 1 aspect does not work

UAD topics require **long term vision,** difficult for citizens

individual interest vs. common interest

NIMBY

Scale UAD, who to include? In 25y the plan looks totally **different** than where you voted for

Discussion: Literature



Overlap

- Public Debate
- Awareness
- Unequal Resources
- Scale is difficult
- Municipalities often act on outcome


Discussion: Literature

New Findings

- Society changed
- Difficult for opponents
- Need for alternative forms
 - Online / digiD

 - Incl. Participation process
 - Scale
 - Include dialogue
- For Public Value conflict
 - Nature Buildings



• More flexibility needed for UAD • Informal voting (non-binding)

• Citizens forum/Stadsgesprek

Discussion: Limitations & Further Research

Limitations

- Newspapers
- Only 2 cases
- Arnhem not develop yet, design changes not clear in detail
- Arnhem unavailable



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Transferability

Need for alternative forms is clear However:

- Depends on the protocol
- Protocol is different for every municipality
- More likely larger cities
