1. The complex reality of genomes should be reflected in graphical structures, rather than linear reference genomes. [This thesis]
2. The democratization of genomics will lead to a privacy nightmare.
3. A critical attitude does not mean being opposable for the sake of being opposable.
4. Lack of consensus in methodologies to analyze, as well as interpret, data is a hindrance to advances in the metagenomics field of research. [This thesis]
5. The failure to appreciate the value of different knowledge systems can lead to a loss of important cultural traditions and wisdom.
6. Technological advancements in NIPT will challenge current understandings of informed consent. [This thesis]
7. The media has played a pivotal role in the way refugees are perceived and portrayed in the Netherlands, often causing damage to their reputation.
8. A product that is introduced to the market to help make consumers' lives easier should not be forced to also serve as a testing ground for citizens.
9. Globalization itself can lead to a pressure on globalization as can be seen in the spread of far-right ideas.
10. Advances in technology have created a disconnect between humans and their ability to understand and control them.
