The US-Mexican border, like most borders, was established by violence – and its architecture is the architecture of violence."

STUDIO BRIEF - THE ARCHITECTURE OF VIOLENCE

Mexico is changing in ways that will profoundly affect its big northern neighbour, and unless America rethinks its outdated picture of life across the border, both countries risk forgoing the benefits promised by Mexico's rise.

The White House does not spend much time looking south. During six hours of televised campaign debates in the 2012 Presidential election, neither Mr. Obama nor his vice-president mentioned Mexico directly. That is extraordinary. One in ten Mexican citizens lives in the United States. Include their American-born descendants and you have about 33m people (or around a tenth of America's population). And Mexico itself is more than the appendix of American imaginations. In terms of GDP it ranks just ahead of South Korea. In 2011 the Mexican economy grew faster than Brazil's—and again in 2012.

Yet Americans are gloomy about Mexico, and so is their government: five years ago Pentagon analysts warned that Mexico risked becoming a "failed state". However, a report by The Economist Magazine in 2012 clearly detailed that is wildly wrong. In fact, Mexico's economy and society are doing pretty well. Even the violence, concentrated in a few areas, has started to abate.

El Paso named safest US city

Despite being located across the border from one of the deadliest cities in the world, El Paso is the safest arge city in the United States, according to cankings released Sunday.

Though the city has been ranked in the top three each year since 1997, this is the first time El Paso has taken the top spot for having the lowest crime rate among cities of more than 500,000 population in the annual rankings by CQ Press, a publishing firm based in Washington, D.C.

Government leaders, law enforcement officials and residents were thrilled with the new ranking.

'This isn't something that mystically or magically appeared," Police Department spokesman Darrel Petry said.

We truly attribute it to our relationship to the community - the trust." The ranking was compiled with data from 2000 in the crime categories of murder, rape, robbery.

Drug violence is out of control in Mexico. Thursday, President Felipe Calderon suggested prosecutors and judges aren't doing enough to bring criminals to justice. Calderon himself has come under criticism. Since he declared war on the cartels in 2006, 28,000 people have died. This year alone, more than 7,000 have died. The violence has taken a new turn.

A cameraman in Juarez barely escaped a grenade attack. Back in his newsroom, Juarez news director Edgar Roman has a new job description. He wants to "preserve the lives of the people out there reporting, covering stories. We don't want to be heroes."
