Goal

The posed problem,	In April 2019 the Notre Dame of Paris set fire. The roof and spire were completely destroyed. Soon after an international design competition was launched for a contemporary reconstruction design. However, within no time, architectural companies launched some extreme ideas which faced a lot of criticism saying that the proposals were very insensitive to the history of the cathedral. People therefore called for an identical reconstruction. In this debate I detect an assumption that rebuilding the Notre Dame à l'identique preserves the		

collective memories and rebuilding differently would mean a loss of these memories and values the French cherish so deeply. Whether I am convinced, also for the sake of authenticity, a design which is not convulsively perfectly identical could equally well represent important parts of the French collective memory.

With heritage there is a delicate balance between the past and today. The past helps us understand where we come from and how we arrived to the thinks we do today. But our notion of the past also always changes and we are constantly reinterpreting our history. Heritage propagates our identity, history and collective values. So also our architectural heritage is constantly reinterpreted. And people are doing this all in there subjective personal way, when it comes to the perception of authenticity or symbolisms. When heritage is reconstructed, every intervention is inevitable a reinterpretation, whether it contains a decision to identically rebuild the past or to create something new (and everything in between). The moment of reconstruction of heritage is a moment for reinterpretation. Only like this reconstruction does not degrade the importance of heritage to the people. The aim of this graduation project is to reinterpret architectural heritage, which in this case involves the Notre Dame of Paris and design a reconstruction proposal based on this reinterpretation. Architectural heritage is tangible but also intangible. Perceptions, emotions and symbolisms are playing an important role. Reinterpreting architectural heritage involves both an analyses of the physical environment and the intangible environment.

How can emotional mapping help to reinterpret architectural heritage?

Emotional mapping leads to identification of both tangible and intangible notions while making that spatial in a map. Drawings facilitate the complexity, subjectivity and ambiguity of different emotions and narratives involved in heritage and link those to spatial characteristics from or around the piece of architectural heritage.

I concluded that the people the Notre Dame spaciously, are not the people that have the strongest symbolic relationship with it. The use of architectural space is disconnected from the symbolic value. I would like to reconnect those again.

Process

To determine the interpretation of the Notre Dame, seven in-depth interviews are conducted. The interviews are semi-constructed and address concepts like form, function, physical context, historical context, intangible context and discourse. Interviewees are asked to draw their answers. Their interpretation of the questions tell a lot about their perception. The interviews are done with a divers group of people consisting of both people that have a religious and secular connection to the Notre Dame, people that consider themselves as strongly connected to the French and Parisian culture and people that do not, tourist for example and lastly; people that have some expertise in architecture or art historic scene.

The input of the interviews are translated to two drawings that give an elaborate view on the Notre Dame and the context (the latest in the most broad sense).
