Exhibition styles are becoming more diverse and the addition of new media has created more requirements for space. Old architectural forms of exhibition need to be changed to adapt them to changing exhibition styles. And how to create a future-oriented building while maintaining the continuity of the building's history requires adapting to the historical texture</li> </ol>	

of the building itself. Therefore, there is a need to pay close attention to the history, culture and materials existing in the building. At the same time, as Richard Rogers says in A Place for All People: Life, Architecture and the Fair Society(2017), "We know that the whole idea of the library will change in the next few years, we cannot predict the future, but we can create a space in which the future can begin." Considering the current needs of the building while keeping some flexibility for its future use may be a way of dealing with the future. In the meantime, Museums and art institutions describe themselves less and less as exclusive spaces dedicated to art, but rather as inclusive and social spaces. Different types of visitors and users actively participate in the museum story. In a large complex, how to ensure that the museum functions while going as open as possible?

## design assignment in which these result.

The design will produce building spaces that are reasonably responsive to needs and find appropriate construction methods and materials to create rich spaces for museums. In my project, I chose to retain most of the existing building due to my agreement with the design language of the existing building and the consideration of sustainability, which at the same time posed some design challenges. I chose to build the new building in the middle of the old one, creating a large space through the truss structure and taking the weight of the new building above the old one. At the same time, I will try to increase the openness and accessibility of the public spaces in order to meet the public and social needs of the museum.

In solving these themes, I will use digital models, handmade models and drawings of different scales, from 1:500 urban plans to 1:20 structural large samples to study the design and add details little by little.

#### Reflection

 What is the relation between your graduation (project) topic, the studio topic (if applicable), your master track (A,U,BT,LA,MBE), and your master programme (MSc AUBS)?

I think this project is a very large and complex public building project that involves the city and the community, public and social, and highly specialised architectural spaces, while at the same time such a large scale building needs to be considered sustainable. The theme of my studio1 was architectural heritage, in which I learnt a lot about the protection and renovation of old buildings, which will help me to deal with the relationship between old and new buildings in my graduation project. For my studio 2, the theme was architectural engineering and we worked on a small public building design on the site of a refugee camp in Jordan, which required low-tech and sustainability, and I realised the importance of sustainability in this project. Therefore I think my final project is relevant to my studies in the studio and master process and I will use what I have learnt in the master process to complete this complex large scale public building design.

2. What is the relevance of your graduation work in the larger social, professional and scientific framework.

The aim of this graduation project is to achieve different levels in the context of its design. Socially and culturally, as a large local art museum, M HKA will become a leading representative for the cultural dissemination of Flemish Arts after its renaming as V MKA. Together with the surrounding docks and city park, it will become a new urban centre of attention, consolidating the development of the fast-growing southern part of Antwerp and promoting social interaction and cohesion. On a professional and scientific level, the project will explore the creation of a large multi-functional public building with a museum, library, collection centre and public centre on a small site and on the basis of existing buildings. The building can be used as a model for similar projects in different communities.
