The project is an investigation of the "Dutch Concept" through its architectural manifestations. It uses architectural and literary theory and structure to form a narrative to set the base for research and the development of the project. The final result will be an architectural fairy tale that will take into consideration the development of the architectural plot and construct a possible ending.

# Thesis project site

The chosen site is the Netherlands. The project investigates Dutch architecture and visual culture.

# Thesis project outcome

The main outcome of the thesis will be a book / fairy tale about Dutch architecture. Along with existing architectural projects and icons that will be critically examined through the project, possible new, fictional characters (of buildings) will be added to aid the story and form counter proposals. These small projects will be, naturally, of a conceptual nature, and will be aimed and critiquing specific aspects or outcomes of Dutch architecture. To accompany the book, drawings will be made in an architecture - fairy -tale style in order to depict the storyline of the tale. More attention will be payed to the portrayal of characters which will be a combination of the built reality, accentuated with elements that correlate the building with the fairy tale archetype. Maps of specific sites within the Netherlands are also possible, but also in relation to the storyline. A text document which describes in detail the process of creating the fairy tale. Along with real historical events that are significant to the architectural development of the Netherlands, relationships will also be formed to a wider scope of architectural discourse. This will help to position and understand better the reasons for architectural peculiarities within this context. A parallel investigation of both the format and the content will be performed throughout the design development and the outcomes will be described in this additional text.

#### Relevance

Along with real historical events that are significant to the architectural development of the Netherlands, relationships will also be formed to a wider scope of architectural discourse. This will help to position and understand better the reasons for architectural peculiarities within the context of the Netherlands. A parallel investigation of both the format of the fairy tale and the architectural content will be performed throughout the design development and the outcomes will be described through drawings and text.

# Structure and method

The conclusion of the project will be a fairy tale about Dutch architecture. The focus point of the project will be the Concept, as an idealized construct. It will be investigated through the form of a fairy tale, which inherently also deals with concepts, constructs and archetypes and is therefore an appropriate medium for this project. The fairy tale will be constructed out of three layers: the fairy tale narrative, which follows the story of the characters through an adventure that is constructed with the purpose of conveying a critique of Dutch architecture; a set of accompanying drawings that will serve as a tool of pointing out, alluding to, and hinting at things that are not explicitly mentioned in the narrative; and a set of "reflection" letters, written by the main character of the story, an unspecified, foreign architect, through which he reflects theoretically upon his adventures, his findings and his thoughts. All three parts of the project are assembled together into one, multilayered fairy tale, which tells a story through three different architectural tools: the description, the drawing and the essay. Even though picture books (some versions of fairy tales) are originally based only on two levels of communication: the visual (representational, iconic) and the verbal (narrative, conventional), I will add the additional layer of the reflective essay which, in this case, is not necessarily considered either iconic or conventional.
