





One week later, the same man in the same entrance. He is holding a pencil with one hand, and with the other, he slides the book through the slit of a letterbox.




DOORS

Every day, she works downstairs in the community room. End every morning, she pours herself a cup of coffee as she sits down, her laptop screen showing the same Word document. Most days, she is alone, only disturbed in her routine by the passing and going of her neighbours.

As the clock rings 5 o'clock, today, like every day, she manically looks up. Patiently, she awaits for his figure to appear in the frame of the glass doors. But today, is not like the other days. Today, as he stands outside, a cigarette between his fingers, she closes the Word document, and steps into the courtyard.



BORED

A child, in the threshold of an open window. He is sitting on a pillow while his legs are hanging through the metal railing. The TV has been turned off, and the voice of adults cover the sizzling sound of a meal being prepared. Next to him, a texbook is open to an exercice spread covered with many red annotations and doodles.

He crosses his arm over the railing and rests his head there. Although the low evening sun blinds him, he looks around the courtyard, searching for a familiar face, or maybe something out of the ordinary. Anything, so long as it could distract him until diner is ready.



A PARTY

A group of children chasing each other. Their laughter fills the sunken courtyard, overlapping with the voices of adults and the music coming out of the community room. On the tiled floor, a chalk hopscotch game is starting to fade. Banners have been hung from the balconies, so that when looking to the sky, one's vision is punctuated by little triangles of red, blue, and white. Many people are tending to different tasks all around the courtyard; starting a barbecue, picking up herbs from the planters, taking out tables and chairs...


On the second floor, across the courtyard, a man is overlooking the scene. He closes his window and turn to his guest.

"20 years I have been living here, you know, and ever since this Kvaka 22 group invested the building, I wished for the government to kick them out. So last year, when it was announced that they were finally doing something with the building, I had imagined everything but that the squatters would remain! All the loud music, and those strange people wondering around, they were not the ideal neighbours, that's for sure.

But to be honest, I think I might have changed my mind. They must have changed the windows or something because I can actually sleep at night now. Also, I don't have an interest in these art exhibitions, I never did really. So I never even went inside. But now that the terrace is accessible from this side and the café open all day, I thought I'd give them a chance. Outside of all the wacky art, they actually serve a pretty decent coffee, and the terrace is sunny in the evening. Maybe we should go together some time.

It's strange, but now it feels like all these new buildings were always here. But you know, somehow it changed everything. It's like the block has turned into a small village. I have noticed that the kids from down that way now come under my window on the weekends to play basketball with my neighbours' children, and their parents even come to sit together at the terrace. It always reminds me of my childhood when I see them running up and down those stairs.

Don't think that it's all perfect though, it's definitely not! Like all those plants they added everywhere; sure it makes pretty flowers and all, but we will see this winter when someone will to have to swipe all those leaves off of the floor!"





A POT OF BLUE PAINT

A woman standing in the courtyard. She is holding a paint brush and a child no more than 7 is sitting on the ground next to her. As she finishes painting a small shelf, the child rises to his feet and places a hand on the brick wall behind them. With a satisfied smirk, he uncovers a blue mark: five fingers and a small palm.

Two people are overlooking the scene, leaning against the balustrade of the balcony.

"- Did you see this? I hope for him his mother won't notice, or he will be in trouble!" They both laugh.


"This place is just nothing like what I expected. Most artists residencies I visited were in the middle of nowhere, and mostly encouraging introspection. But here we are, in the heart of the city. And yet, it is still a very protected space. I don't think I would ever walk into this courtyard without knowing where I was going. Perhaps that's what makes this space different, it's quite unexpected. Everything contrasts so much with the ordered and loud street. It's like entering a small world hidden in plain sight.

I think people's description of the events in the courtyard also mislead me to think the space was much bigger than it is. But then, I saw the concert the other day, and I understand now. All the windows opened, and the people standing in their threshold, the balconies crowded; it felt like the whole space became one of these old theatres. The way the sound resonated against the facades, it was wonderful.

A cry from the mother brings their awareness back to the courtyard.

"Ah, finally she noticed! I get the kid though. You know, all these blank walls are screaming for some colour. Hey, weren't you the one who wanted to do something with the residents? Maybe a mural activity woud be fun?


